As Issues Chairman for the Back Country Horsemen of Montana the following bill in the House of Representatives has been brought to our attention and it needs our immediate action by contacting our congressional delegates and voicing our opposition to this legislation.

Dan has placed on the website a copy of an article that appeared in the GF Tribune this week. Looks like this thing could have some far reaching implications on our public lands and environmental laws.

We have also attached a PDF copy of the bill itself please pay close attention to the opening statement to the bill, its scary enough in its self; To prohibit the Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture from taking action on public lands which impede border security on such lands, <u>and for other purposes</u>.

Also please look at the bill on page 3 Item 16 <u>Description of Laws Waived</u> this runs through page 5. There is a summary at the bottom of this letter.

It's shocking to read the long list of laws to be waived, literally a generation of democratic process wiped clean on millions of acres of public land.
